

To All the Boys I've Loved Before by Jenny Han

SESSION #5 (CH. 25-32)—Summer 2026 ESL360 Book Club

This summer we are reading *To All the Boys I've Loved Before* by Jenny Han. The novel is about a teenage girl navigating first love, family, and the slow process of figuring out who she is. Each week's discussion is also framed by a short passage from *The Laws of Human Nature* by Robert Greene.

Robert Greene is one of the most widely read authors in the world. His books have sold millions of copies and have been translated into dozens of languages. His book *The Laws of Human Nature*, published in 2018, became a number one New York Times bestseller immediately. The book draws on psychology, philosophy, history, and biography to identify eighteen patterns in human behavior that shape what we do, often without our awareness. Greene has a talent for taking difficult ideas from scientists and philosophers and making them clear and useful for everyday readers. The book is not a textbook. It reads more like a guide to understanding the people around you and the person you are still becoming.

You do not need to read Greene's book. Each week, one short passage is provided on your session sheet. Think of it as a camera lens. Jenny Han shows us a story. Greene provides a way of looking at it. The laws selected relate directly to what happens in the novel. Lara Jean is a teenager figuring out who she is and what she wants. The people around her illustrate, in real and recognizable ways, the very patterns Greene spent years studying. Reading the novel through Greene's lens makes the story richer and our discussions deeper and more interesting.

SESSION 5: CHAPTERS 25-3 & THE LAW OF COVETOUSNESS

Covetousness is a strong desire to have something that seems out of reach, especially something that might be taken away or that someone else appears to want.

FROM THE NOVEL

GREENE'S LAW

Robert Greene writes that human desire is shaped by one powerful force: we want most what we cannot easily have. When something is always available to us, we stop appreciating it. But when it becomes scarce, when it might be taken away, or when someone else seems to want it, our desire for it suddenly grows stronger. This is not a flaw in a few people; it is a basic feature of human psychology. Greene calls it **covetousness**. It is the deep, instinctive desire to have what is just out of reach. We see it in the way we suddenly want something more the moment we think we might lose it. We see it in the way another person's love or attention becomes more precious when it is no longer guaranteed. Understanding this helps us ask an honest question. When we want someone, is that desire genuine? Or is it simply a reaction to the fear of missing out?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Why do Peter and Lara Jean pretend to be boyfriend and girlfriend? Are their motivations the same or different? Greene says desire grows strongest when something seems scarce or might be taken away. What does Peter's and Lara Jean's relationship reveal about how the law of covetousness works in practice?
2. In Chapter 26, Lara Jean tells Josh that she and Peter could talk for hours and that he really gets her. Josh squints, says he never saw Peter as the reading type, and walks away. This is not the reaction Lara Jean was hoping for. What was she hoping Josh would feel, and how does this connect to what Greene describes about desire and scarcity?
3. Greene says the pull toward something that is just out of reach is universal. Have you ever found yourself wanting something more the moment it seemed less available?

double take n. /ˈdʌb.əl teɪk/ DUB-ul tayk

If you do a double take when you see or hear something surprising, you react slowly because you need a moment to process what you have seen or heard.

"Emily Nussbaum does a double take when she sees us." Ch. 25



crow v. /kroʊ/ kroh

If someone crows, they are loudly pleased about something and show this in a boastful or triumphant way. Note: crow is also the name of a black bird.

"Now that Peter and I have everything worked out, I can triumphantly crow all about it." Ch. 26



smirk n. /smɜːrk/ smurk

A smirk is a smile that expresses satisfaction or pleasure about something bad that has happened to someone else, or about a secret advantage you have.

"When Genevieve's back on the sidelines, Peter has a satisfied smirk on." Ch. 29



gleefully adv. /ˈɡliː.fəl.i/ GLEE-fuh-lee

If you do something gleefully, you do it with great delight, often at someone else's expense.

"'Can't touch me,' she says gleefully." (Ch. 31)



quantify v. /ˈkwɒn.tɪ.faɪ/ KWAHN-tih-fy

If you quantify something, you measure it and express it as a number or amount.

"I don't feel like it's my responsibility to quantify myself for them." (Ch. 32)

Question Formation

In English questions, the auxiliary verb (do, does, did, am, are, is, will, would, can, could, may, must, might) comes BEFORE the subject.

Form: Auxiliary verb + subject + BASE form of main verb?

Statement: She likes Peter. → Question: Does she like Peter?

Statement: They went home. → Question: Did they go home? (did + BASE form, not past tense)

Statement: Come to my party. → Question: Will you come to my party?

Statement: He ate an entire pizza. → Question: Did he eat an entire pizza/ (did + BASE form, not past tense)

Common errors:

- ✗ "Why she left?" ✓ "Why did she leave?"
- ✗ "Where you are going?" ✓ "Where are you going?"
- ✗ "What he said?" ✓ "What did he say?"
- ✗ "Did he cleaned?" ✓ "Did he clean?"

Subject questions — when the **subject** is the question word, no auxiliary verb is needed:

- ✓ "Who kissed Peter?" (Who = subject) ✗ "Who did kiss Peter?"
- ✓ "What happened next?" (What = subject) ✗ "What did happen next?"

From the book:

"Are you seriously taking the bus every day?" Ch. 25

→ auxiliary (are) before subject (you)

"What do you guys even talk about?" Ch. 26

→ do + subject + base verb

"Have you lined up an internship for the spring?" Ch. 30

→ present perfect question
