Be Interested ↔ Be Interesting

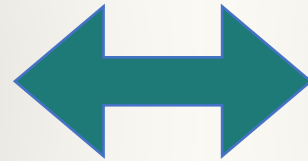
I am **interested**.

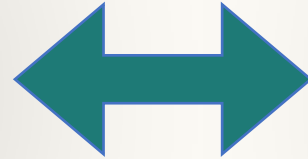

Contribute something of yourself.

CONNECT · SHARE

Good conversation moves back and forth between both.

Last class: Give people something specific to respond to.

Today: Notice what other people give you — and build from it.

Interested or Interesting?

HOW SOMEONE FEELS OR REACTS	WHAT CREATES OR HAS THAT EFFECT
I'm interested .	The conversation is interesting .
I'm bored .	The lecture is boring .
I'm excited .	The news is exciting .
I'm fascinated .	The documentary is fascinating .
I'm surprised .	The ending is surprising .
I'm confused .	The directions are confusing .
I'm disappointed .	The ending is disappointing .

What pattern do you notice?

The Meaning of -ed and -ing

-ed

often describes someone's **experience, feeling, or state**

-ing

describes the person, thing, event, or situation that **creates or has that effect**

False: “-ed is for people; -ing is for things.” **True:** adjectives ending in -ed and -ing can both apply to people.

She's an interesting person. He's a boring speaker.

The Meaning of -ed and -ing

-ed

-ing

False: “-ed is for people; -ing is for things.” **True:** adjectives ending in -ed and -ing can both apply to people.

But don't monopolize the conversation*

Let the conversation develop naturally.

BE INTERESTED

Listen & show interest

REACT

Really? • Oh, wow! • That's surprising!

COMMENT

That's interesting. • That sounds fascinating. • That must have been frustrating.

ASK

What was that like? • What made you decide to...? • How did you get interested in...?

BE INTERESTING

Contribute something

CONNECT / SHARE

I've had a similar experience. • That reminds me of... • I've always been interested in... • Someone I know...



Listen for the doors people open. **Connect — then step aside.** *You mentioned... • Going back to what you said about...*

Think about the conversation you just had.

What is something interesting you learned?

What did someone say that made you want to hear more?

English in the Wild

Looks for ways to practice what you've learned

SHOW INTEREST

Follow something the other person says instead of immediately introducing a new topic.

CONTRIBUTE

Share a relevant experience, thought, interest, or connection of your own.

GO BACK

Return to something interesting the person said earlier:

"You mentioned earlier that..."
